Thank you, Marty, and congratulations to our very deserving award winners.

**(SLIDE 12)** This has been a very productive year at AIR, and I'd like to share some highlights of the progress made by the Board and staff, starting with the release of the **AIR Statement of Ethical Principles**, a guide for the use of higher education data.

The Statement outlines 11 overarching principles and is a statement of integrity rather than a code of conduct that could be used to sanction individuals. The Statement was developed with significant input from the community and ultimately approved by the Board of Directors in August 2019.

The 11 principles and their descriptors are available in a one-page printable PDF for easy reference on the ethics webpage, airweb.org/ethics. The webpage also includes scenarios that provide examples of how the principles could be used in practice.

**(SLIDE 13)** In addition to the core products and services offered by AIR, such as the Forum, IPEDS training, and online professional education, this slide highlights two newer pieces of work that focus on strengthening institutional data capacity and individual skills through partnerships with other associations.

AIR partnered with EDUCAUSE and NACUBO on a joint statement in fall of 2019—**Change with Analytics**—urging broader and more intentional use of analytics for data-informed decisions that benefit students and institutions.

AIR is also partnering with the Association for Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) to develop a **Data Literacy Institute** funded by Ascendium. The institute establishes the knowledge, skills, mindsets, and habits needed for individuals to use data strategically to make better and ethical decisions.

Both initiatives to support and model the importance of collaboration across institutional units particularly student affairs, information technology, and business offices—to transform institutions through the effective use of data for improved outcomes.

(SLIDE 14) AIR also completed three long term investments in 2019 that I'd like to highlight:

- 1. We upgraded and expanded technology to improve user experience and increase engagement, including an association management system and an online community platform to facilitate communication and idea-sharing.
- 2. We also updated our logo and visual branding. After using our previous logo for nearly four decades, we updated our visual brand and logo to help differentiate our association, ensure consistency, and more effectively communicate the value of data-informed decision making.
- 3. In conjunction with the brand refresh, we redesigned and modernized our website to allow users to find what they need more quickly and better reflect our new visual brand. Our new website was nominated as the Sitefinity Nonprofit Website of the Year in the nonprofit category, and I'm proud to announce that our site won the award.

(SLIDE 15) Thank you, Christine.

This year the NEC worked to increase the number of nominations and individuals willing to be considered for the ballot. The nominations website was streamlined to make nominating easier - nominators needed only an individual's name to nominate them, no justification or nomination to specific positions were required. Sessions were held at the Forum and names of interested individuals were collected - each of these individuals was contacted during the nomination season and encouraged to self nominate. Additionally, the NEC contacted affiliate organizations and encouraged them to submit nominations.

The Committee was pleased with the quality and volume of nominations this year. To encourage completion of the Nominee Questionnaire, NEC members sent personal emails to each nominee who had not completed the questionnaire prior to its closing. Of the more than 175 individuals who were nominated, 104 completed the questionnaire and 52 were willing to be considered.

The committee built the slate with an eye toward the need for diversity in institutional type, geographic region, and candidate demographics - not only on the slate but also on the Board and NEC that would result from the election. The committee was particularly cognizant of the need for representation of the western portion of the United States and internationally. On the NEC, the committee recognized a similar need for geographic and institutional diversity, though the NEC needed more public representation.

Elections were conducted during February and the results of the election were certified on March 10, 2020.

(SLIDE 18) Thank you, Michelle, and welcome to the new Board and Committee members.

**(SLIDE 19)** The AIR Board as a whole is responsible for overseeing the financial health of the organization. The Treasurer is also responsible for presenting an annual report of AIR's financial condition at the annual Forum, managing Board travel, and researching comparable CEO compensation every three years.

The Treasurer ensures that the Board has sufficient information to make sound financial policies. Three of the CEO Monitoring Reports reviewed and discussed by the Board deal specifically with the association's finances — (1) financial planning, (2) financial condition and activities, and (3) asset protection — and evaluate how the CEO handles the executive limitations set by the Board.

The governance policies and executive limitations related to the association's finances provide a level of protection, set boundaries, and serve as a warning mechanism, if needed.

The Treasurer provides leadership for the independent annual audit, which reviews the Financial Statements and findings from an independent audit firm concerning the financial state of the association.

The firm of Thomas Howell Ferguson P.A., Certified Public Accountants of Tallahassee, Florida was chosen by the Board. The 2019 audit was completed earlier this month and discussed and accepted by the Board on May 12. The auditors issued a clean audit report that indicated that the audit disclosed no instances of significant deficiencies and/or material weaknesses in the association's internal controls.

#### (SLIDE 20) Key results

1) Unmodified opinion issued on the Financial Statements with no reportable instances of significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control and no material instances of noncompliance.

2 | Unmodified opinion issued on the Major Federal Award Programs with no reportable significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control over major federal programs.

3 | Current total net assets are \$3,569,042. In 2019, expenses exceeded revenues resulting in a net loss of \$523,014. The loss was planned as a mechanism to invest a portion of the reserves to increase AIR's technology, infrastructure, and capacity to deliver products and services for the benefit of the AIR community.

- As for the AIR Forum, hopefully you've seen that we have gone virtual. The AIR Forum Virtual takes place June 29<sup>th</sup> through July 1<sup>st</sup>, on an easy-to-use virtual platform.
- Starting in June, we'll begin holding regular coffee chats, providing another opportunity to connect around specific questions and challenges we're now facing. Many of these conversations will bring in data from flash polls we're conducting to better understand your current challenges and needs.
- And finally, I want to highlight our Summer Essentials Webinars, which features curated content on hand-picked topics impacting our work.

I encourage you to visit airweb.org for more information about each of these new programs and to get involved. We will continue to monitor the changing environment and work to provide solutions and programs to support you during this tough time.

Amount of net loss was greater than planned due to greater customization and implementation costs related to the new association management system, the new website, and new accounting systems. Internal processes were also streamlined and improved. But the disruption meant less time was available to create, promote, and deliver products and services. [\$305K loss planned and listed on the financial planning report.]

Outlook for 2020. Overall, financially stable.

Continue to monitor impact of COVID-19 on higher education institutions, our community, and the association. All of HE faced with uncertainty and disruption. Expect the need for better data to make effective and ethical decisions to increase but budgets will likely be tight for everyone. Important for AIR to remain flexible, responsive, and relevant to meet new and/or emerging needs of community – take advantage of our new technology

Also important to closely monitor and cut costs where possible. Any future decisions will be made with the best interests of the association in mind. Strong spirit of collaboration and respect among Board and staff.
